Area of Focus 1: Student Achievement

A. Describe how the LEA will develop and implement a well-rounded Title I, Part A program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students.

The LEA held a Federal Programs' Stakeholder Meeting to obtain input from all stakeholders. A comprehensive needs assessment and an overview of each federal program were explained. The stakeholders' input was shared with all federal program administrators, district administrators, and principals for consideration. Principals conducted comprehensive needs assessments using their FOCUS Analytics dashboard that provides real time data to determine their areas of need. Title I, Part A funds will be used to strengthen core instruction, meet the needs of MTSS Tier II and III students, provide supports to address the social-emotional needs of students, and provide teachers the opportunity and supports to increase their capacity to deliver quality instruction.

B. Describe how the LEA will identify Title I, Part A students who may be at-risk for academic failure.

Bay District identifies students who may be at risk of academic failure through the use of Universal Screeners, Early Warning Systems, and End of Year state assessments. Universal Screeners are administered three times a year, in the fall, winter, and spring. School teams review the results of the Universal Screeners and based on cut scores determine which students require additional academic support. Students who score below proficient are enrolled in course-specific interventions in secondary. Students in Elementary are placed in Tier 2 or Tier 3 depending on their academic needs. Early Warning System reports are pulled each month to review and determine if additional support is needed.

C. Describe how the LEA will provide additional educational assistance to individual students the LEA or school determine need help in meeting Florida's challenging academic standards.

The LEA provides students who need additional educational assistance through the implementation of Response to Intervention through the MTSS model. Students are placed in academic tiers and provided targeted or intensive intervention support based on their individual needs. Supports may be provided in small groups or individually based on the student's needs. Progress is monitored on a weekly or monthly basis depending on the level of supports required.

D. Describe how the LEA will identify and implement instruction and other strategies intended to strengthen and improve school conditions for student learning.

The BDS Student Wellness Team and MTSS Behavior Teams provide customized training and professional development (PD) to district staff and personnel who in turn utilize this information with students school-wide. Training topics include, but are not limited to, Trauma Informed Care, Tier 1 implementation, Classroom Management, Bullying, Brain Friendly Teaching, Youth Mental Health First Aid, and Positive Behavior Supports. The ultimate goal of the on-going PD is to build capacity and promote awareness and understanding of the importance of social emotional learning and its impact on students' achievement and well being.

The Botvin Life Skills Training Program is implemented at identified BDS elementary and middle schools. The Botvin Life Skills curriculum is a research-validated substance abuse prevention program proven to reduce the risks of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse, opioid misuse, and violence by targeting the major social and psychological factors that promote the initiation of substance use and other risky behaviors.

The Merrell's Strong Kids curriculum is being made available to every school, including the charters. This is a student capacity building curriculum focusing on emotions and the social-emotional skills. Some of the topics include managing anger, reducing stress, and solving interpersonal problems. BDS uses the CofC referral process for tracking the number of students at high risk for mental health or co-occurring substance abuse disorders that have been referred for, screened or given an assessment for mental health services or supports. This process is initiated at the school level by the school problem solving team or at the request of a parent but always with parental notification. The school completes demographic information about the student, the perceived problem(s) of the student and the parent's input. This information is then sent to the BDS Student Wellness Team for review. Contact is made with the parent again to align the identified needs of the student with services of the BDS Student Wellness team or Community Based Partners. Families' unique perception of mental health services requested, pay source and availability are all taken into consideration. The referral is then sent to the agency identified as most appropriate and they reach out to the families for the initial intake / assessment appointment and further services. If referred to a community based agency will report back to the BDS Student Wellness Team will coordinate to remove any barriers, if appropriate with the school based counselors, social workers and paraprofessionals that have direct contact with the student and parent.

E. Describe the LEA's strategy to implement supporting efforts to reduce the overuse of discipline practices that remove students from the classroom. This may include identifying and supporting schools with high rates of discipline, disaggregated by each of the subgroups of students, as identified in section 1111(c)(2).

All elementary schools will continue implementing an In-School Suspension program that is proactive and restorative in nature. Each elementary school will have a P.R.O.M.I.S.E. (Preventing Recidivism through Opportunities, Mentoring, Interventions, Support and Education) Room. The goal of this program is to provide students who have committed a behavioral infraction the necessary time to recover, reflect, and return to class, ultimately decreasing discipline incidents and increasing instructional time for students. The room will be supplied with children's social skills literature, de-escalation and sensory materials, and technology for students to complete web-based social skills activities. The P.R.O.M.I.S.E. program will have interventions and restorative strategies embedded within the guidelines in an effort to positively impact and change problem behavior.

The school problem solving team work alongside a school based team of mental health professionals called a triad team. This triad team consists of a combination of bachelor's level, master's level or licensed clinician at each site. The focus of the team is to provide equitable access to behavioral support services within each school, addressing barriers to academic and social success, while enhancing students' emotional development, well-being and safety through the multi-tiered systems of support within the school.

The mental health professionals will focus on mindfulness activities using the Mind Up curriculum, modeling lessons in classrooms; Trauma Sensitive Classroom training supports and target support groups for students of trauma. Outside mental health provider referral systems will also be made available to students whose needs are beyond the level of mental health support for an educational setting.

All registrars, schools' office staff, and CWA case managers have been trained in foster care enrollment laws. The LEA's foster care point of contact will provide training annually as a reminder that foster care students are enrolled immediately without the required documentation. The receiving school requests records from the sending school immediately. Upon receiving the required to the receiving school immediately.

C. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure the development and implementation of clear, written procedures for how transportation will be provided, arranged, and funded for a child's duration of time in foster care in collaboration with the appropriate Child Welfare Agency (CWA).

The CWA's point of contact notifies the LEA's point of contact when there is a foster child making a change in placement. Information concerning the child is gathered by both agencies so that the most informed decision can be made about what is in the child's best interest. If it is determined that it is in the child's best interest to remain in the school of origin, then means of transportation will be discussed. If there is a school bus route in place, the student will ride that route at no charge. If there is not a route in place, then the following will be decided:

If available, transportation will be provided and funded by the CWA via:

· Contracting with the foster parent or guardian of the child. (mileage reimbursement)

Issuing public transit passes.

Using a taxi service.

Collaborating with other public agencies

If none of the above options are available, then district and Title I, Part A funds will be used to pay the excess cost of creating a new route or adding a new bus stop for the student. If a bus is not available and if CWA does not have funds to reimburse the foster parent to provide transportation, the LEA will reimburse the foster parent for mileage at the state rate.

A. Describe the LEA's strategy to increase students access to early college, high school, dual or concurrent enrollment opportunities, or career counseling to identify student's interests and skills. Describe how programs are aligned to high skill, high need, and high wage occupations.

Bay District Schools continues to offer early college access to students through Advanced Placement (AP), Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE), International Baccalaureate (IB) and dual enrollment opportunities with Gulf Coast State College and Florida State University - Panama City Campus. Bay District Schools is part of the Florida Partnership for Minority and Underrepresented Student Achievement Grant. As a Florida Partnership district, we utilize tools, resources and support to move the College and Career Readiness agenda forward in powerful ways. This partnership district Schools lege (CSC) to establish Navigators at each of the high schools. These Navigators are employees of GCSC, housed on the high school campus, who focus on career counseling, transitioning from high school to post-secondary - which may include Technical Schools and/or military in addition to the traditional Oldege/University path.

B. Describe the LEA's strategy to support work-based learning opportunities that provide students in-depth interaction with industry professionals and, if appropriate, provide academic credit.

Bay District Schools has Career Pathway Programs at each of the 7 district high schools (Arnold, Bay, Bozeman, Mosley, North Bay Haven, New Horizons & Rutherford High Schools) and CTE classes at 10 middle schools (Breakfast Point Academy, Bozeman, Rutherford, Jinks, Merritt Brown, Mowat, Tyndall Academy, North Bay Haven, Bay Haven, Bay Haven, & Surfside Middle Schools). There are 49 programs around the county representing the 16 Career Pathways: Advanced Manufacturing, Agriculture Biotechnology, Alliel Health, Applied Cybersecurity, Digital Information/Business Technology/Digital Media, Computer Science, Construction, Culinary, Early Childhood, Engineering, Finance, Hospitality and Tourism, Sports, Recreation, Entertainment Marketing, Entrepreneurship, Gaming and Simulation, Landscape Operations, Unmanned Systems and Web Design. These programs rely on regular interactions with businesses, the community and post-secondary educational providers like Guif Coast State College, Florida State University - Panama City and Haney Technical College etc. Career and Technical programs invite public speakers to present to their classes, wist post-secondary programs that fit with their career aspirations, have the opportunity to participate in job experiences like internships, job shadowing, virtual simulations and co-op. Bay District High Schools also have access to the NEPRIS platform that allow teachers to bring currently employed workforce individuals into their classrooms to talk about their work, careers, review student work and make suggestions, offer FASFA trainings for students and their parents. Bay District students have earned 8,518 Industry Certifications in the last 6 years. Bay District CTE programs offer dtheir if are result of their first "Girls In Engineering" Program for middle school girls who designed high heeled shoes in cooperation with women community engineers as mentors.
