## Area of Focus 1: Student Achievement

#### A. Describe how the LEA will develop and implement a well-rounded Title I, Part A program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students.

The LEA held a Federal Programs' Stakeholder Meeting to obtain input from all stakeholders. A comprehensive needs assessment and an overview of each federal program were explained. The stakeholders' input was shared with all federal program administrators, district administrators, and principals for consideration. Principals conducted comprehensive needs assessments using their FOCUS Analytics dashboard that provide supports to address the needs of students, and provide teachers the opportunity and supports to increase their capacity to deliver quality instruction.

#### B. Describe how the LEA will identify Title I, Part A students who may be at-risk for academic failure.

Bay District identifies students who may be at risk of academic failure through the use of Universal Screeners, Early Warning Systems, i-Ready, and the state's FAST assessments. Universal Screeners are administered three times a year, in the fall, winter, and spring. School teams review the results of the assessments and, based on cut scores, determine which students require additional academic support. Students who score below proficiency are enrolled in course-specific interventions in secondary. Students in elementary school are placed in Tier 2 or Tier 3 depending on their academic needs. Early Warning System reports are pulled each month to review and determine if additional support is needed.

#### C. Describe how the LEA will provide additional educational assistance to individual students the LEA or school determine need help in meeting Florida's challenging academic standards.

The LEA provides students who need additional educational assistance through the implementation of Response to Intervention through the MTSS model. Students are placed in academic tiers and provided targeted or intervention support based on their individual needs. Supports may be provided in small groups or individually based on the student's needs. Progress is monitored on a weekly or monthly basis depending on the level of support required.

#### D. Describe how the LEA will identify and implement instruction and other strategies intended to strengthen and improve school conditions for student learning.

The BDS Student Wellness Team, ESE, Professional Learning, and MTSS Behavior Teams provide customized training and professional development (PD) to district staff and personnel who in turn utilize this information with students school-wide. Training topics include, but are not limited to, Trauma Informed Care, Tier 1 implementation, Classroom Management, Bullying, Brain-Friendly Teaching, Youth Mental Health First Aid, Ukeru, Level Up, and Positive Behavior Supports. The ultimate goal of the ongoing PD is to build capacity and promote awareness and understanding of the importance of life skills learning and its impact on students' achievement and well-being.

The Botvin Life Skills Training Program is implemented at select BDS middle schools. The Botvin Life Skills curriculum is a research-validated substance abuse prevention program proven to reduce the risks of alcohol, tobacco, drug abuse, opioid misuse, and violence by targeting the major social and psychological factors that promote the initiation of substance use and other risky behaviors.

Grades 6-12 students receive 5 hours of Resiliency Education. Students are provided with instruction in topics such as strategies to develop healthy characteristics that reinforce positive core values and foster resiliency, recognition of signs and symptoms of mental health concerns, strategies to support a peer, friend, or family member through adversity, etc.

Additionally, Merrell's Strong Kids curriculum is available to every school, including charter schools. This is a student capacity-building curriculum has partially scripted lessons, handouts, and worksheets. Through this program, teachers have everything they need to implement the program with little added cost or preparation.

BDS uses the CoC referral process for tracking the number of students at high risk for mental health or co-occurring substance abuse disorders who have been referred for, screened, or given an assessment for mental health services or support. This process is initiated at the school level by the school problem-solving team or at the request of a parent but always with parental notification. The school completes demographic information about the student, the perceived problem(s) of the student, and the parent's input. This information is then sent to the BDS Student Wellness Team for review. Contact is made with the parent again to align the identified needs of the student with the services of the BDS Student Wellness Team or Community-Based Partners. Families' unique perceptions of mental health services requested, pay source, and availability are all taken into consideration. The referral is then sent to the agency identified as most appropriate, and they reach out to the families for the initial intake/assessment appointment and further services. If referred to a community-based agency, the agency will report back to the BDS Student Wellness Team the date of the initial assessment as well as the date that services were initiated. The BDS Student Wellness Team will coordinate to remove any barriers with the school-based counselors, social workers, and paraprofessionals who have direct contact with the student and parent, as appropriate.

In the 2024-2025 school year, Bay District Schools initiated the Substance Diversion Program. This program was aimed at students found in possession and/or using substances such as THC, alcohol, or similar. The program aimed at providing students with education to deter them from continued use of substances detrimental to their health and well-being. The program will be expanded next year to include educational opportunities for nicotine as well. Threaded throughout the Substance Diversion Program are opportunities for students and their parents/guardians to consent to treatment for substance use.

## E. Describe the LEA's strategy to implement supporting efforts to reduce the overuse of discipline practices that remove students from the classroom. This may include identifying and supporting schools with high rates of discipline, disaggregated by each of the subgroups of students, as identified in section 1111(c)(2).

All elementary schools will continue implementing an In-School Suspension program that is proactive and restorative in nature. Each elementary school will have a P.R.O.M.I.S.E. (Preventing Recidivism through Opportunities, Mentoring, Interventions, Support, and Education) Room. The goal of this program is to provide students who have committed a behavioral infraction the necessary time to recover, reflect, and return to class, ultimately decreasing discipline incidents and increasing instructional time for students. The room will be supplied with children's social skills literature, de-escalation and sensory materials, and technology for students to complete web-based social skills activities. The P.R.O.M.I.S.E. program will have interventions and restorative strategies embedded within the guidelines to positively impact and change problem behavior.

The school problem-solving team works alongside a school-based team of mental health professionals called a triad team. This triad team consists of a combination of bachelor's level, master's level or licensed clinician at each site. The focus of the team is to provide equitable access to behavioral support services within each school, addressing barriers to academic and social success, while enhancing students' emotional development, well-being and safety through the multi-tiered systems of support within the school.

The Coordinator of Student Placement, who oversees discipline training in the district, annually convenes a committee of administrators to discuss discipline-related issues. The committee provides input related to essential training needed for administrators to ensure discipline that is firm, fair, and consistent. One such outcome is that all discipline consequences on the discipline matrix will be hard-coded into our Focus system so that administrators may go below, but may not exceed the discipline matrix.

The District Behavior Problem-Solving Team meets weekly to discuss students with high rates of physical aggression, intense behavior needs, and similar. The team is comprised of team members from: MTSS, ESE, Student Wellness (mental health and discipline), and Threat Management. The team makes recommendations to school teams, such as intervention initiation or modification, the support of behavior specialists such as Board Certified Behavior Analysts, Community of Care referrals, etc. The goal of the team is to help school teams disrupt the pattern of inappropriate behavior before it rises to a level of Administrative Placement, Alternative Placement in lieu of Expulsion, or Expulsion.

Title I schools utilize Title I funds to reduce the adult/student ratio to provide students more attention and to prevent problem behaviors. Behavior paraprofessionals support identified students, assist students in ISS, and provide supervision during times of high rates of misbehavior. Funds are used to support and promote a positive and safe environment by implementing Leader in Me. Ron Clark House System. Ukeru. Positive Behavior Support System. and Level Up System.

#### F. Describe the funded activities that will be implemented to address Area of Focus 1.

Supplemental Personnel: Expenditures include salaries; benefits; supplements for advanced degrees, grade chair/leadership or school improvement, and for employees at schools with a high risk of personal injury. Amounts shown below are salaries only, unless otherwise indicated. Object codes are used by our district.

The LEA's Title I funds will coordinate with Title IX funds for the Homeless Liaison, one Social Worker, one Student Support Care Manager, and one bilingual Parent Liaison. Roll Forward funds will support one Student Support Care Manager and one MSW Grad Coach. TIPA will pay 35% of the homeless liaison salary, two additional team members (Social Worker salary and Student Support Care Manager salary).

The Homeless Liaison will provide homeless identification trainings for school staff, LEA staff, and community partners; and attend outreach opportunities to identify homeless students and youth as outlined in McKinney Vento Law. All team members (McKinney-Vento Partners) will conduct case management to ensure students identified as homeless are connected to resources to eliminate academic and attendance barriers. Gas is purchased for a district provided van that is used to transport homeless families, when no other transportation is available, to meetings at the schools or community appointments needed to remove barriers. Funds are set aside to pay for the Camera license fee in one van used to transport homeless students and families. This license fee is due to a smaller team and not enough personnel to ride along when needed. Funds are set aside to pay transportation the excess miles for school of origin transportation to ensure school stability or mileage reimbursement at the state rate for parents to provide transportation when routes are not feasible. Funds are also set aside for six McKinney-Vento partners to attend the 2025 National Family Engagement Summit virtually in October.

The CWA schedules a staffing, which includes the CWA case manager, staff from the previous school, staff from the proposed school, the LEA's foster care contact, and others as warranted (sometimes the biological parent, the foster parents, etc.). During the staffing process, a decision is made regarding whether the child should remain at their school of origin. If it is determined that it is in the best interest of the child to remain in the school of origin, the LEA's foster care liaison contacts the district's transportation department to determine a bus route for the student. If it is not feasible, the foster parents are reimbursed the state mileage rate for providing transportation to the school of origin.

#### B. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure the successful enrollment and transfer of records of children enrolled in a new school, even if they do not have the required documentation.

The LEA's foster care point of contact provides training annually for the registrars as a reminder that foster care students are enrolled immediately without the required documentation. The LEA foster care point of contact requests and receives the student's records from the previous school and then forwards the records to the receiving school. The LEA foster care contact also updates the demographic data in Focus, such as adding the new foster parents' names & address, the contact information for the case manager, etc. She works closely with the school registrar prior to the foster parents registering the student so that enrollment is immediate.

#### C. Describe the activities that will be implemented to ensure the development and implementation of clear, written procedures for how transportation will be provided, arranged, and funded for a child's duration of time in foster care in collaboration with the appropriate Child Welfare Agency (CWA).

The CWA's point of contact notifies the LEA's point of contact when there is a foster child making a change in placement. Information concerning the child is gathered by both agencies so that the most informed decision can be made about what is in the child's best interest. If it is determined that it is in the child's best interest to remain in the school of origin, then the means of transportation will be discussed. If there is a school bus route in place, the student will ride that route at no charge. If there is not a route in place, then the following will be decided:

If available, transportation will be provided and funded by the CWA via:

Contracting with the foster parent or guardian of the child. (mileage reimbursement)

Issuing public transit passes.

Using a taxi service.

Collaborating with other public agencies.

If none of the above options are available, then district and Title I, Part A funds will be used to pay the excess cost of creating a new route or adding a new bus stop for the student. If a bus is not available and if CWA does not have funds to reimburse the foster parent to provide transportation, the LEA will reimburse the foster parent for mileage at the state rate.

#### D. Describe the funded activities that will be implemented to address Area of Focus 7.

#### A. Describe the LEA's strategy to increase students access to early college, high school, dual or concurrent enrollment opportunities, or career counseling to identify student's interests and skills. Describe how programs are aligned to high skill, high need, and high wage occupations.

Bay District Schools continues to offer early college access to students through Advanced Placement (AP), Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE), International Baccalaureate (IB), CTE, and dual enrollment opportunities with Gulf Coast State College, Florida State University - Panama City Campus, Haney Technical College. Bay District Schools is part of the Florida Partnership for Minority and Underrepresented Student Achievement Grant. As a Florida Partnership district, we utilize tools, resources, and support to increase student equity and access. This partnership has increased enrollment in early college access classes and opened up these classes to non-traditional students. Bay District Schools partners with Gulf Coast State College (GCSC) to establish Navigators to serve the high schools. These Navigators focus on career counseling and transitioning from high school to post-secondary - which may include Technical Schools and/or military in addition to the traditional college/university path. Bay District Schools also implemented Xello as a career counseling tool to identify student interests and skills and align them with appropriate coursework. School counselors and teachers were trained in the first-year implementation of the tool. Our CTE expansion aligns programs to high-skill, high-need, and high-wage occupations.

#### B. Describe the LEA's strategy to support work-based learning opportunities that provide students in-depth interaction with industry professionals and, if appropriate, provide academic credit.

Bay District Schools has Career Pathway Programs at each of the eight district high schools (J. R. Arnold, Bay, Deane Bozeman, A. C. Mosley, Rosenwald and Rutherford High Schools; North Bay Haven Career Academy and New Horizons Learning Center) and Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes at ten middle schools (Breakfast Point Academy, Bozeman, Rutherford, Jinks, Merritt Brown, Mowat, Tyndall Academy, North Bay Haven and Surfside Middle Schools).

There are 49 programs currently representing the 16 Career Pathways. Some of the program titles are Agriculture Biotechnology, Allied Health Assisting, Applied Cybersecurity, Computer Science Principles, Construction, Criminal Justice Operations, Commercial Art Technology, Culinary Arts, Digital Design, Early Childhood Education, Engineering, Entrepreneurship, Horticulture Science and Services, Hospitality and Tourism, Gaming and Simulation, Landscape Operations, Principles of Teaching, Unmanned Aircraft Systems and Veterinary Assisting. Students are provided opportunities to earn industry-recognized digital tool certificates and/or industry certifications to advance their college and career readiness. Bay District offers over 33 industry certifications and students have earned over 14,000 Industry Certifications in the last 10 years.

These meaningful programs rely on regular interactions with businesses, the community, and post-secondary educational providers like Gulf Coast State College, Florida State University - Panama City (FSU-PC), and Haney Technical College, etc. to help us provide first-hand experiences with tasks required within a particular career field of study.

Career and Technical Education programs invite public speakers to present to their classes, visit post-secondary programs and industry partners, and participate in workplace learning opportunities like internships, job shadowing, virtual simulations, and Cooperative Education/On the Job Training (OJT).

Bay District Schools has Integrated Technology Clubs that are sponsored by FSU-PC Ascent to encourage all students to learn about career and professional skills and technology in a fun and stimulating environment with their peers.

Bay District Schools also offers additional programs to inspire girls to consider CTE Career Pathways. Programs such as "Girls In Engineering" Night. Middle school girls are guided through an engineering design process in cooperation with a community of women engineers as mentors; while the Girls Who Code Program focuses on closing the gender gap in computer science and technology.
