# **BUS EXPULSION HEARING**

Present: School Board Chairman Steve Moss; School Board Vice Chair Pamm Chapman; School Board Members Ginger Littleton, Ryan Neves and Jerry Register; Sarah Whaler, Coordinator of Student Placement Options and Attorney Heather Hudson.

Attorney Heather Hudson called the Bus Expulsion Hearing to order at 10:37 A.M.

1) Merritt Brown Middle School student – A.B. Case #1819012

Attorney Hudson stated that the student's parents had been notified to appear at 10:00 a.m. and that it was now 10:37 a.m. and no one had appeared so the School Board would proceed with the hearing.

The student was charged with vandalism and property damage under \$1,000 while on Bay District Schools transportation. Attorney Hudson requested that School Board Exhibits #1 through #5 be admitted into evidence. Sworn testimony was given by Sarah Whaler, Coordinator of Student Placement Options and Michelle Spencer, Assistant Administrator, Merritt Brown Middle School.

Motion by Littleton, seconded by Chapman, to accept the Superintendent's amended recommendation (that the student be expelled from riding the bus to Merritt Brown Middle School for the remainder of the 2018-19 school year and offered alternative placement at CC Washington Academy during the expulsion period). Motion was approved 3 - 2 with Neves and Register voting no.

The hearing concluded at 11:08 A.M.
