Discipline Matrix

The Bay District Schools Discipline Matrix is a tool for administrators to respond appropriately when students have committed behavioral infractions, per the Code of Student Conduct. This tool is designed to offer consistency at all levels across the District so that students are disciplined appropriately from school to school when their behavior requires punishment beyond the classroom. The Matrix provides progressive disciplinary actions to address multiple behaviors. School principals have the discretion to deviate from these guidelines by assessing an appropriate consequence other than stated in the Matrix if he or she determines in his or her sole discretion that there are mitigating or aggravating circumstances.

School bus drivers will provide an initial warning to all students. Upon reoccurrence, the bus driver will contact individual parents to inform them of the problem behavior(s) and seek support. Subsequent bus infractions will result in a referral.

Suggested Behavior Interventions

1. CICO-Check In/Check Out (10 minutes per day, 5 times per week)

Designed to provide support and monitoring for students at-risk of developing serious or chronic behavior problems

Goals/expectations are developed and are monitored daily with a point card

- Instruction on expectations and social skills
- Daily check-in before school and check-out at end of the day with a positive adult mentor
- Regular check-in with teachers during the day to complete point card
- Data system to monitor student progress

Linking school and home support

- Provides opportunity for positive student/parent contact so student knows what is expected
- He/she receives attention/tangibles throughout the day for meeting these expectations
- Parents provide attention for meeting expectations
- Self-monitoring skills are developed

Best for: Students seeking adult attention, problem behavior throughout multiple settings, and mild acting out.

Fidelity: Daily fidelity log completed by the assigned CICO coordinator. Fidelity log should be uploaded to Enrich a minimum of once per 9 weeks.

Progress Monitoring: Daily, using school-wide core expectations CICO behavior report card to help identify patterns of behaviors (times, locations, groupings etc...).

2. Mentoring (Should be a minimum of 30 minutes per week)

Intensive mentor program using school staff and community volunteers as mentors. Staff members volunteer and are surveyed about the type of student they would like to mentor and the amount of time they have available. Mentors are encouraged to meet with their assigned student as often as needed. This program is not a reinforcement plan. The goal of this program is to improve student behavior by providing the student with access to a caring role model. Access to the mentor should not be based upon the student's behavior. This intervention needs to be provided with fidelity for a period of time. The efficacy of this intervention should be monitored monthly.

Implementation will require:

- Training for staff and community mentors (very good PowerPoint on mentoring is available)
- Parent letter
- Form to collect information from the teacher about the student (Interest Inventory/Reinforcer Survey)
- Log or sign-in to support program fidelity

Best for: Students with more intense levels of behavior who need daily support, adult attention seeking, daily problematic behavior

Fidelity: mentor-completed fidelity log; uploaded into Enrich a minimum of every 9 weeks. **If Elevate Bay mentors do not meet with students weekly, then another person on campus will need to meet the weekly requirement.**

Progress Monitoring: Progress monitoring will be daily using a behavior report card aligned to schoolwide expectations and weekly averages will be entered into Enrich.

3. Social Skills Groups (Should be a minimum of 30 minutes per week)

With a full repertoire of social skills, students will have the ability to make social choices that will strengthen their interpersonal relationships and facilitate success in school. Social Skills Groups can take the form of Lunch Bunch, Monday Morning Group or any other format deemed appropriate for your student population.

- Outcomes:
 - Child resiliency in the face of future crises or other stressful life events
 - Students who seek appropriate and safe avenues for aggression and frustration
 - Children who take personal responsibility for promoting school safety
- Students with poor social skills have been shown to:
 - Experience difficulties in interpersonal relationships with parents, teachers, and peers
 - Evoke highly negative responses from others that lead to high levels of peer rejection
 - Peer rejection has been linked with school violence on several occasions
 - Show signs of depression, aggression and anxiety
 - Demonstrate poor academic performance as an indirect consequence
 - Show a higher incidence of involvement in the criminal justice system as adults
- Implementation:
 - Create groups of 3-5 students with similar skill deficits
 - Small groups give students a chance to observe others, practice with peers, and receive feedback
 - Remove obstacles to learning
 - Try to meet early in the day so kids are attentive and have the whole day to practice what they learn in the lesson

Best for: students with behavioral skill deficits

Fidelity: attendance log with lesson identification

Progress Monitoring: rating scale completed by the teacher at least weekly, the rating scale is directly related to the skills being taught in the class. Continue to collect other data as relevant such as discipline referrals, parent alerts, class discipline system data, etc.

4. BDS 360

Suspensions and expulsions can reward inappropriate conduct and negatively impact student learning. Schools and districts across the country are moving away from out-of-school suspensions and toward more constructive disciplinary practices. Suite360: Intervention turns discipline into a learning opportunity by providing students with lessons based on their infraction. Content includes videos, interactive games, articles and other engaging multimedia.

Best for: Students with common code of conduct infractions and utilized as an alternative to suspensions. The intervention should be used with students that are exhibiting behaviors such as aggression, non-compliance, disruption, drug and substance abuse etc...

Fidelity:

- If being used as an intervention for a Tier II or Tier III plan, fidelity log of the lessons completed and the outcomes should be documented and uploaded to Enrich a minimum of once per 9 weeks.
- If being used as an alternative to suspension, responsible adult will assign lessons that target the specific code of conduct violation the student exhibited. Responsible adult should conduct a follow-up of the lesson(s) the student completed to ensure full understanding of the concepts.

Progress Monitoring: Progress monitoring will be determined by the Tier II or Tier III plan.

5. ZooU-Hall of Heroes (Should be a minimum of 30 minutes per week)

School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting

SESIR Codes and Definitions The following SESIR definitions were developed to enable school districts to correctly code data used to report incidents that are against the law or represent serious breaches of the code of student conduct. This includes those incidents considered severe enough to require the involvement of a School Resource Officer (SRO) or incidents to be "Reported to Law Enforcement." The following definitions are not meant to match the Uniform Crime Report, nor are they intended to be an additional reporting system for law enforcement. When interviewing student behavior for SESIR reporting, consideration should be given to both developmental age-appropriate behavior and to those students with an Individual Educational Plan (IEP) or a 504 Plan.

INCIDENTS THAT MUST BE REPORTED TO SESIR AND ARE EXPECTED TO INCLUDE CONSULTATION WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT

ALCOHOL (ALC)-LEVEL IV

(possession, use, or sale) Possession, sale, purchase, or use of alcoholic beverages. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation.

*ARSON (ARS)-LEVEL I

(intentionally) setting a fire on school property. To damage or cause to be damaged, by fire or explosion, any building, structure, or convenience, whether occupied or not, or its contents.

*BATTERY (BAT)-LEVEL I

(physical attack/harm) The physical use of force or violence by an individual against another. The attack must be serious enough to warrant consulting law enforcement and result in more serious bodily injury. (To distinguish from Fighting, report an incident as Battery only when the force or violence is carried out against a person who is not fighting back.)

♦BREAKING AND ENTERING/BURGLARY (BRG)-LEVEL II

(illegal entry into a facility) Unlawful entry with force, or unannounced presence in a building or other structure, or conveyance with evidence of the intent to damage or remove property or harm a person(s).

♦DISRUPTION ON CAMPUS-MAJOR (DOC)-LEVEL III

(major disruption of all or a significant portion of campus activities, serious sponsored events, and school bus transportation) Disruptive behavior that poses a serious threat to the learning environment, health, safety, or welfare of others; example: serious trouble, causing a riot, initiating a false fire alarm, (do not use this code for students denying authority, disobeying or showing disrespect to others, using inappropriate language or gestures, or classroom disruption.)

DRUG SALE/DISTRIBUTION EXCLUDING ALCOHOL (DRD)-LEVEL II

(illegal sale or distribution of drugs) The manufacture, cultivation, sale, or distribution of any drug, narcotic, controlled substance, or substance represented to be a drug, narcotic, or controlled substance.

DRUG USE/POSSESSION EXCLUDING ALCOHOL (DRU)-LEVEL III

(illegal drug possession or use) The use or possession of any drug, narcotic, controlled substance, or any substance when used for chemical intoxication. Use means the person is caught in the act of using, admits to use or is discovered to have used in the course of an investigation.

♦HAZING (HAZ)-LEVEL III

Any action or situation that endangers the mental or physical health or safety of a student at a school with and of grades 7 through 12 for purposes of initiation or admission into or affiliation with any school-sanctioned organization. "Hazing activities" are not limited to (a) harassing, coercing, or forcing a student to participate in illegal or dangerous behavior; or (b) any brutality of a physical nature, such as whipping, beating, branding, or exposure to the elements.

*HOMICIDE (HOM)-LEVEL I

(murder, manslaughter) The unjustified killing of one human being by another.

*KIDNAPPING (KID)-LEVEL I

(abduction of or the removal forcibly, or by threat, confining, abducting, or imprisoning another person against his/her will and by threat, authority, or physical authority).

♦PHYSICAL ATTACK (PHA)-LEVEL II

(physical attack refers to an actual and intentional striking of another person against his/her will, or the intentional causing of bodily harm to an individual.

♦ROBBERY (ROB)-LEVEL II

(using force to take something from another) The taking or attempted taking of anything of value that is owned by another person or organization, under the confrontational circumstances of force or threat of force or violence, and/or by putting the victim in fear.

LARCENY/THEFT (STL)-LEVEL III

(taking of property from a person, building, or a vehicle) The unauthorized taking, carrying, riding away with, or concealing the property of another person, including motor vehicles, without threat, violence, or bodily harm. (The Items(s) value must be \$100 or more to report in SESIR.)

SEXUAL ASSAULT (SXA)-LEVEL II

An incident that includes a threat of: rape, fondling, indecent liberties, child molestation, or sodomy. Both male and female students can be victims of sexual assault. The threat must include all of the following elements: 1) intent; 2) fear; 3) force; and 3) capability.

*SEXUAL BATTERY (SXB)-LEVEL I

(attempted or actual) Force or attempted oral, anal, or vaginal penetration by using a sexual organ or an object stimulating a sexual organ, or the anal or vaginal penetration of another by any body part or object.

SEXUAL OFFENSES (OTHER) (SOXO)-LEVEL III

(lewdness, indecent exposure) Oral sexual contact, including intercourse, without force or threat of force. Subjecting an individual to lewd sexual gestures, sexual activity, or exposing private body parts in a lewd manner. Law enforcement must be notified to investigate.)

THREAT/INTIMIDATION (TRE)-LEVEL III

(threatening fear in others) A threat to cause physical harm to another person with or without the use of a weapon that includes all of the following elements: 1) intent - an intention that the threat be heard or seen by the person who is the object of the threat; 2) fear - a reasonable fear or apprehension by the person who is the object of the threat that the threat could be carried out; and 3) capability - the ability of the offender to actually carry out the threat directly or by a weapon or other instrument that can easily be obtained.

TRESPASSING (TRS)-LEVEL II

(illegal entry onto campus) to enter or remain on school grounds/campus, school transportation, or at a school-sponsored event/off-campus, without authorization or invitation and with no lawful purpose for entry.

VANDALISM (VAN)-LEVEL III

(destruction, damage, or defacement of school or personal property) The intentional destruction, damage, or defacement of public or private property without consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it. (Damage must be \$1,000 or more to report in SESIR.)

WEAPONS POSSESSION (WPO)-LEVEL II

(possession of firearms and other instruments which can cause harm) Possession of any instrument or object, as defined by Section 900.002, Florida Statutes, or altered code of conduct that can inflict serious harm on another person or that can place a person in reasonable fear of serious harm. Possession of a common pocketknife is exempted from state zero tolerance weapon requirement 1006.07(2) F.S.; however, law enforcement should be notified of any weapon or knife, including pocketknives, for investigation.)

♦OTHER MAJOR (OMC)-LEVEL III

(major incidents that do not fit within the other definitions) Any serious, harmful incident resulting in the need for law enforcement intervention not previously classified. Examples: Student producing or knowingly using counterfeit money, participating in gambling activities, possessing child pornography, or possessing drug paraphernalia.

INCIDENTS THAT MUST BE REPORTED TO SESIR BUT MAY NOT NEED TO INCLUDE CONSULTATION WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT

♦BULLYING (BUL)-LEVEL IV

(intimidating behavior) Systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees that is severe or pervasive enough to create an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment, or unreasonably interfere with the individual's school performance or participation.

♦FIGHTING (FHT)-LEVEL III

(mutual combat, mutual altercation) When two or more persons mutually participate in use of force or physical violence that requires either 1) physical restraint or 2) results in injury requiring first aid or medical attention. (Do not report to SESIR lower level fights such as pushing, shoving, or altercations that stop upon verbal command. Use local codes.)

♦HARASSMENT (HAR)-LEVEL IV

(insulting behavior) Any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gesture, use of color or computer software, or written, verbal, or physical conduct that: 1) places a student or school employee in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person or damage to his or her property; 2) has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities, or benefits; or 3) has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of a school including any course of conduct directed at a specific person that causes substantial emotional distress in such a person and serves no legitimate purpose.

♦SEXUAL HARASSMENT (SXH)-LEVEL III

(unfused sexual behavior) Unwanted verbal or physical behavior with sexual connotations by an adult or student that is severe or pervasive enough to create an intimidating, hostile or offensive educational environment, cause discomfort or humiliation, or unreasonably interfere with the individual's school performance or participation (65-229.004(3) SEE Rule. No incident when one person demands a sexual favor from another under the threat of physical harm or adverse consequence.

TOBACCO (TRC)-LEVEL IV

(cigarettes or other forms of tobacco) The possession, use, distribution, or sale of tobacco or nicotine products on school grounds, at school-sponsored events, or on school transportation by any person under the age of 18.

REPORTING GUIDELINES

REPORTED TO LAW ENFORCEMENT – "Reported to Law Enforcement" means that an official action was taken by a School Resource Officer (SRO) or a local Law Enforcement Officer such as a case number was assigned, a report was filed, an affidavit was filed, a civil citation was issued, an investigation was conducted and found to be an incident reportable to SESIR, or an arrest was made. The presence of notification of or consultation with a Law Enforcement Officer or SRO, is not sufficient for an incident to be coded as "Reported to Law Enforcement."

LEVELS I - IV – PRELIMINARY RANK ORDERING OF INCIDENT TYPES FOR SCHOOL REPORTING—Level I incidents are the Most Serious, and Level IV incidents are the Least Serious; General Rule: When multiple incidents occur at the same time and place, code the incident that is the most serious incident. The incident that caused the most injury or the highest loss of property or monetary cost should be the one reported. The particular context of the incidents should also be considered when determining the level of seriousness. If school personnel determine that an incident, coded at a lower level is more serious, it is an incident that they judge to be more serious. Any Related Elements that apply must also be reported.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS FOR SESIR INCIDENTS

The following disciplinary actions are the only actions that should be reported for SESIR incidents. (C) Corporal Punishment; (I) In-School Suspension; (O) Out-of-School Suspension; (H) Suspension Expendes; Pending Hearing; (E) Expulsion without Services; (F) Expulsion with Services; (P) Alternative Placement; (U) Change in Placement (not to exceed 45 days) following a drug, weapon, or serious bodily injury offense for students with disabilities only; (S) Other SESIR Offense; (M) Mechanical Behavior; (R) Physical Restraint and (I) Services. These disciplinary actions may also be used for less serious local incidents with the exception of (S). Other SESIR Offense and (U) Change in Placement. Note: Districts are reminded to update code (F) Suspension Expendes, Pending Hearing to (E), (F), or (P) for Survey 9 (based on the final outcome of the school board hearing).

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS FOR VIOLENT INCIDENTS

The U.S. Department of Education (US ED) has mandated reporting requirements for SESIR which include reporting of "violent incidents with physical injury" and "violent incidents without physical injury." SESIR has identified "Violent Incidents" as Kidnapping, Homicide, Battery, and Sexual Battery. (A large set of precedes "Violent Incidents") **Violent Incidents that Result in Bodily Injury** are Arson, Bullying, Breaking and Entering, Disruption on Campus-Kidnap, Fighting, Harassment, Hazing, Other Major Offense, Physical Attack, Robbery, and Sexual Harassment. (A large diamond precedes "Violent Incidents if they Result in Bodily Injury".)

When reporting any of the above violent SESIR incidents, districts must also complete the "Injury-Related" element. The "Injury-Related" element is broken down into three separate codes: More Serious, Less Serious, or No Serious Bodily Injury. This allows DOE to monitor US ED reporting requirements for more information, please refer to the current SESIR Definitions and Guide lines, and Appendix 1, Definition for Incident Reporting.

RELATED ELEMENTS

FOR EACH SESIR INCIDENT, APPLICABLE "RELATED ELEMENTS" MUST ALSO BE REPORTED TO SESIR.

Alcohol-Related	Male Crime-Related
Bullying-Related	Hazing-Related
Drug-Related	Injury-Related
Gender-Related	Weapon-Related

Parameters for all Related Elements may be found in the document current SESIR Definitions and Guidelines, and the DOE Information Data Base Requirements, Automated Student Information System, Automated Student Data Elements, Every Weapon Possession Incident should be coded as Weapon-Related and should include the "Weapon" Description" data element.
